Thoughts from our Executive Director, Jim Gannon

New beginnings are a trademark of the work done by Catholic Charities in our communities. In every Center there is opportunity to see "new beginnings" fostered and nurtured. For example, in our Center for Resettlement, someone may witness families who started out fleeing rockets and bombs now learning a new language, adjusting to a new culture, and learning that America is the home to opportunity, but not gold-paved roads.

In the Center for Educational Opportunity, we may meet a student who is tired of the limits that incomplete education has on their employment opportunities. These students sometimes forgo a meal and a night of TV for the rigors of classroom instruction and tutoring in the pursuit of knowledge – a path to growth, accomplishment, self-confidence and advancement.

In our Center for Self-Sufficiency, the family that has found a cot in a shelter, or huddled together at night in an automobile may welcome a new beginning as they turn the key for the first time on a door that gives way to their apartment. They know that this new beginning did not come without strings attached, there is the case manager who will be coaching, urging and expecting that children go to school, and that parents get jobs, that positive family dynamics are re-established, and fractured relationships are healed. New beginnings come with new expectations and new obligations and family members are called on to do their part.

Through our Center for Community Involvement, a volunteer will experience a new beginning after retirement. Rather than their familiar office position, they will take on the task of helping a senior stay connected by providing a smile on a ride to an appointment. They might surrender writing computer code for pay to take on enhancing databases for case managers with far too large caseloads or help volunteer tracking and resettlement.

We pray that we inspire the individual to accomplish their new beginning on their own, with a helping hand. We ask for the right

Lessons and Insights on Refugee Resettlement from Toronto

Reflections by Rev. Andrew J. Paviak, Pastor, San Felipe de Neri Church in Old Town Albuquerque

For four days near the end of August, a group of visitors from the USA were invited to a set of meetings hosted by the Archdiocese of Toronto in Canada focused on refugee resettlement. The USA contingent included the Very Rev. John Daniel, Vicar General of the Archdiocese of Santa Fe (ASF), James Gannon, CEO, Catholic Charities ASF, Diana Leal, Case Manager Catholic Charities ASF, Dick Hogan United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, Kristan Schlichte, Catholic Charities USA and myself. The purpose was truly meant to be a "fact-finding mission." It was so much more than that when it was all done; it was one of those experiences that disturbs one's soul to a deep place of movement.

Our hosts were primarily the members of the Office of Refugees for the Archdiocese of Toronto (ORAT). Their leader, Dr. Martin Mark with his talented staff introduced us to the various offices within the Archdiocese of Toronto who deal with resettlement of refugees, whom they call, "Newcomers." The ORAT staff also introduced us to other governmental-sponsored offices, two separate parishes and other individuals for whom the "Newcomer" ministry is truly a calling to which they have responded with open hearts and arms.

The days were filled with humbling stories of the people who have been welcomed to Canada at a time of great strife in their lives. One of the most touching experiences was when we were welcomed to a home set up by the people of the parish of St. Anthony of Padua in Brampton. This home is where a lovely family of eight from Africa has been living since their arrival to





Canada in February. This family, prior to being welcomed as "Newcomers" to Canada spent SIXTEEN YEARS in a refugee camp hoping, praying and waiting to possibly get a new start in life that for many seemed just to be a sort of dream. The home was modest, clean, lovely and warm with the sounds of laughter, joy and hope. The father and mother were most welcoming AND honest about the sort of life they left behind in Africa. Clearly, this family had a great sense of God's direction bringing them to this new land. The home was prepared by a resettlement group of parishioners of St. Anthony led by their coordinator and dynamic force named Paulin Murphy, Director of Social Ministries for the parish. Paulin was assisted by two lovely parish ladies (and LOTS of other volunteers) who prepare homes, often apartments or single family homes, with furniture, dishes, food and such for a family coming to resettle. The folks preparing these homes are not professional Social Workers. They are however, regular, caring parishioners who are responding to the call of Jesus, Our Holy Father Francis and the Bishops of our Church to welcome the stranger in our midst.

The greatest take away from our experience has been to share this story of hope; realizing the need to look at our own opportunities to assist with resettling our own "Newcomers," and pray for refugees and those who might welcome them. We need to really challenge ourselves to see what we can do to respond to God's call in our lives to embrace Matthew 25:40, "whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me."


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Inspiration from our Community
